You have just had a **Cold Coagulation** to destroy abnormal cells, or cauterise delicate cells on your cervix.

Here is some important information for you to observe:

- No intercourse (sex) for four weeks.
- Do not use tampons for the next four weeks.
- Shower or bathe daily but DO NOT put anything in the water, i.e. bubble bath or salt etc.
- It is not advisable to do any exercise, heavy lifting, or swimming for two weeks after treatment.

You may notice the following:

- A vaginal discharge. This may be pink or blood stained, or very watery. This discharge can last up to six weeks.
- If you have heavy bleeding (other than a period), you should contact your GP, this could indicate infection, initially a course of antibiotics can be prescribed. If the heavy bleeding persists then you should contact the hospital Emergency Room on 0151 702 4140.
 Your next period should be normal. Occasionally it is reported to be heavier than usual, if you are concerned contact your GP.

 Do not stop the Contraceptive Pill.
 If you develop a smelly discharge, again this could indicate infection and you need to contact your GP.

WE CANNOT STRESS ENOUGH THE IMPORTANCE OF YOUR CONTINUED ATTENDANCE AT THE HOSPITAL.

Following Cold Coagulation we need to see you once more in the Colposcopy department in six months so we can repeat your smear and make sure the cervix is healed and showing a normal appearance.


If the Colposcopy is normal and the smear is reported normal, then you will be discharged back to your GP for a more regular smear check.
